Benevolence - \$ 31,190.00

Utilities - \$32,389.87

Property Taxes, Insurance, Gas, Electricity, Water, Sewer, Trash, Telephone, Internet, and Cable. The utilities of St. Mark keep things moving. Most of our missions here require spaces to be heated, illuminated, and safe.

Mortgage - \$35,784.00

St. Mark is blessed to have a wonderful piece of property here in Lacey. Through the years many changes and improvements have been made. We have grown from a farm house that housed all activities at St. Mark to the structures we have today. Currently we have a mortgage with Thrivent Financial. The monthly payment required on the mortgage is less than \$3,000. Payment of this mortgage is an essential part of the continued growth of our congregation.

Buildings & Grounds - \$9,800.00

Buildings and grounds can be leveraged to support a church's mission and to extend its presence in the community. Maintaining this physical presence allows us the ability to provide the congregation and visitor with a safe and beautiful place to worship and a peaceful location where they might rest and contemplate the nearness of God.



Administration - \$72,259.87

The church administration keeps our programs and services running. Administration is communication, scheduling. interaction, diplomacy, resource management, and much, much, more.



Music - \$83,599.65

Music supports and enhances the worship service. Our message is enriched through the talents of many, guided by dedicated and gifted professional musicians. 'Let your song rise up.' St. Mark without music is hard to imagine.

Stewardship - \$11,696.33

Stewardship is not just financial giving but taking care of those gifts that the Lord has given us and sharing them with others. Money, time, expertise, love and even a warm smile are all to be shared. We can never run out of something worthwhile to give."



Education - \$21,647.06

Worship - \$95,147.38


We gather for worship on Sunday mornings, with two services. In the weeks leading up to Christmas and Easter, we have additional weekday evening services. Worship is liturgically based, with a variety of musical settings. All are welcome at the Lord's Table each Sunday. There are many opportunities for member participation in the various worship opportunities.

Fellowship - \$14,041.91

Fellowship abounds at St. Mark, from the coffee and snacks between worship times, to potluck meals. We have wonderful space for groups to meet for planning and conducting the business of the church, as well as fellowship opportunities. There are on-going groups such as Seniors Together, St. Mark Old Guys, and a hiking group that is just starting.

Evangelism and Website - \$31,264.81

God's work, our hands. What a beautiful image as God calls us to serve others in our community. We plant and harvest food, we minister to home bound congregational members, we provide clothing to homeless youth and give them a safe place to clean their clothes, we give back packs to homeless kids, and we have branched out to our local school district. These are just some examples of how we do God's work. Evangelism is the heart of St. Mark. St. Mark's robust web site draws the community to our congregation. It informs and inspires our members and others by sharing sermons, congregational news and up coming church life events.



Pastoral Care - \$41,139.72

Pastoral Care includes all the ways in which the pastors care for the people of God. Primarily, this includes such things as preaching, teaching, counseling, leading worship, listening to confessions and offering absolution, prayer, baptisms, Confirmation, weddings and funerals. We also receive the Word of God individually from our pastors to comfort us

when we are troubled, to strengthen us when we struggle, and to give us counsel and guidance.

Our pastors care for each of our members, not only through their public preaching and teaching of the Word of God, but also by bringing that Word into our homes, when we are hospitalized or home bound, or when we are burdened by sorrow, grief, or shame. In addition, our pastors care for members of our community who are in need of spiritual support. It is important to be together as the people of God.





WHERE DOES MY OFFERING GO?



ELCA members in more than 9,300 congregations in the United States and Caribbean give approximately \$1.75 billion in regular offering to support ELCA ministries in their local communities and worldwide. When members give through their congregations, a percentage of that money is then shared with the local synod and the national churchwide organization.

This unrestricted giving, called Mission Support, gives us both the foundation and the fuel to do God's work in the world and a portion of the gifts circle back to support ministries in synods and local congregations. Of these unrestricted gifts, the churchwide organization receives around 2.6 percent. This represents the largest portion of the ELCA churchwide organization's operating budget.



Facilitate dialogue and common action among communities of other faiths, including the development of resources and communications for ELCA congregations.



The ELCA has worked with Lutheran World Relief to repurpose \$160,000 in project funding for emergency responses to the COVID-19 pandemic in Latin America, Africa and Asia.

In Latin America, the funding will be used for food assistance in Guatemala, El Salvador and Honduras, which have been hard-hit by the coronavirus and the resulting economic disruption that is causing increased hunger. In Africa, the support will provide improved water, sanitation and hygiene, along with personal protective equipment, to displaced communities in South Sudan. And a project in Nepal will ensure that quarantine facilities are hygienic and comfortable, and that households economically affected by COVID-19 are able to cultivate their crops and sustain their small-scale businesses.

"The ELCA has a tradition of standing with our global neighbors in good times and in bad," said the Elizabeth Eaton, presiding bishop of the ELCA. "Our partnership with Lutheran World Relief is a reflection of that strong commitment and allows us to deepen and extend it in this time of extreme crisis."

ELCA WORLD HUNGER

As members of the ELCA, we believe God is calling us into the world — together. ELCA World Hunger is our church's ministry working to break the cycle of hunger and poverty. Through Global Mission's international programming, gifts to ELCA World Hunger were at work in over 60 countries in 2018.

The world provides enough food for all, but more than 800 million people around the world face chronic hunger. We believe in a God of abundance, so as a church, we live out our call in baptism to strive for a just world where all are fed. Internationally, this includes supporting the transformative ministries of our companion churches and partners around the world.

Eswatini/Swaziland

By growing spinach and tomatoes to feed her family, Mary Zwane is helping make her rural community of Lugedzeni less vulnerable to HIV and AIDS. With funds from ELCA World Hunger, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa–Eastern Diocese supplied seeds and training to 482 gardeners, indirectly feeding almost 3,000 people. The project's objective is to improve the quality of life in three rural communities for orphans, vulnerable children, the elderly, people living with HIV and people living with disabilities.

Lutheran Disaster Response brings God's hope, healing and renewal to people whose lives have been disrupted by disasters in the United States and around the world. When the dust settles and the headlines change, we stay to provide ongoing assistance to those in need.

Mozambique/Zimbabwe

In March 2019, Cyclone Idai ravaged Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi, causing more than 1,300 deaths and \$2.2 billion in damages. "I saw rocks and muddy waters coming into our room, and soon I was half-buried under rubble," said Enia, who lost her husband, home and possessions in Zimbabwe's Chimanimani district, Funds from Lutheran Disaster Response are helping the Lutheran World Federation and other partners walk alongside people such as Enia, offering food, shelter and psychosocial support and strengthening early-warning systems. Thanks to them, said Enia. "I am able to survive."

A Message from Congregational Council & the Financial Planning Committee

This year we are again attempting to provide you with a motivational view of how our financial gifts relate to the various ministries within our congregation.

The sections on the inside of this brochure reveal the amount of the spending plan that will be devoted to each ministry area. Additionally, each section provides some insight into how those resources will be used in that area. By combining pictures and brief comments, we hope that you will be left with an inspiring vision of each of our ministries. The line chart provides a graphic representation to visually relate the portion of our overall budget that is devoted to each area.

The Approved Spending Plan for 2021 contains increases for staff and clergy in order to abide with the minimum recommendations of the Southwest Washington Synod of the ELCA as well as a 6.5% benevolence for a total increase of \$7601.61.

This plan represents less than a 1.61% increase compared to the 2020 spending plan.

In addition to our tithes and offerings which support our spending plan, we are blessed as a congregation to have designated funds to pursue many of our ministries and goals.

Again, it is our hope that this narrative will provide an inspiring vision of our spending plan here at St Mark.
